Come See The Longhouse

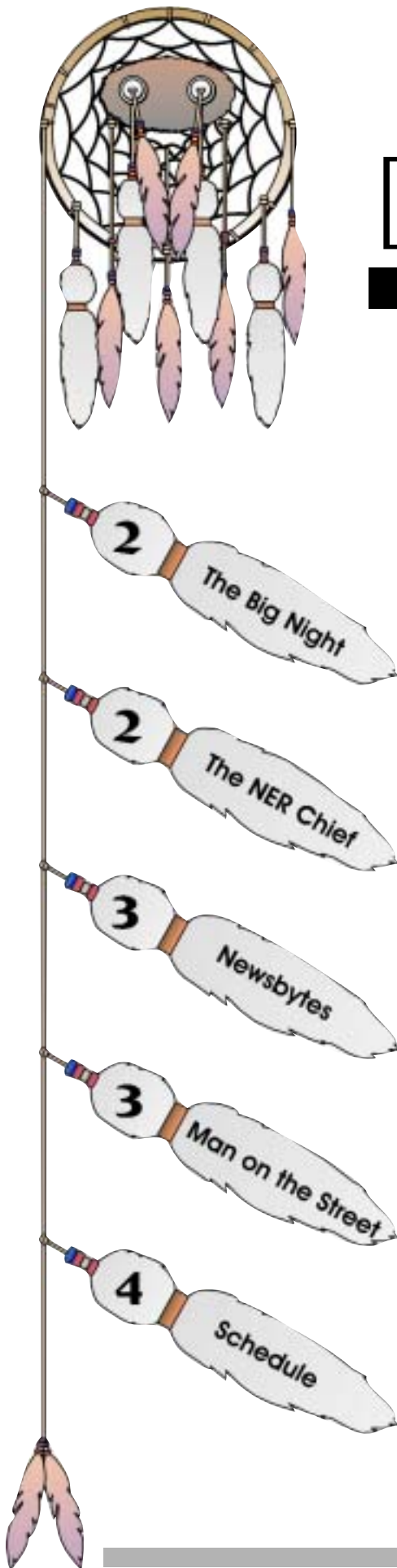

Tonight, from 8-10 p.m., the American Indian Affairs committee will host the Eastern Coast Longhouse Pow-Wow. The Iroquois Longhouse presentation will take place in the gym near the upper field. Although this will not be a period longhouse, the presentation will be historically accurate.

The staff of AIA has been working hard on this event and will provide a learning and spiritual experience for all who will grace the doors of the longhouse. A representation of tribes from the Eastern coast will be presented, focusing on the Iroquois confederacy and Seminole

tribes of Florida. Additionally, representatives from Esseau Huppeday Lodge, the 2002 NOAC Team Champions, will be presenting a team dance.

Everyone in attendance will be given the chance to experience first hand an opportunity to see regalia from the tribes of the Seneca, Creek, Mohawk, and Seminole Tribes. There will be mostly social dancing and everyone will have ample time and opportunity to dance. Tonight, bring nothing but the love of the sash and the ideals of great Scouting for this good chance to learn and see other people. This is an opportunity that does not happen every day, so grasp it and seize the day!
